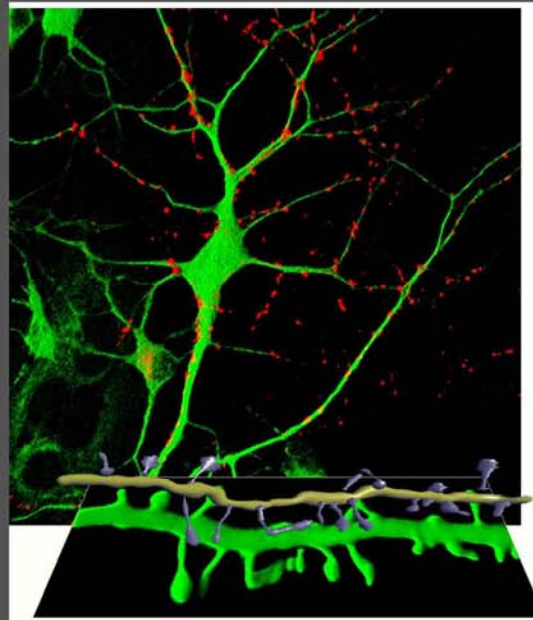

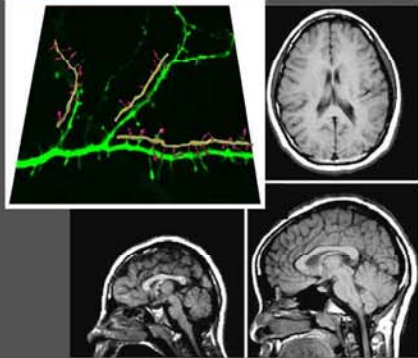

The journal publishes experimental and descriptive studies whether carried out in the laboratory or field.

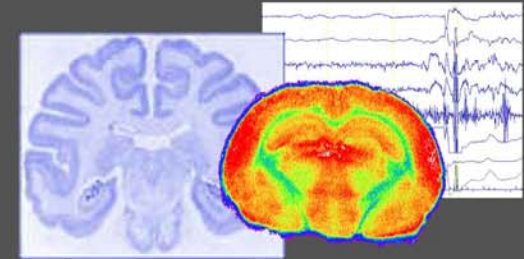
The journal also publishes review articles and theoretical papers that make important conceptual contributions.

Developmental Psychobiology also publishes Letters to the Editors, which discuss issues of general interest or material published in the journal.

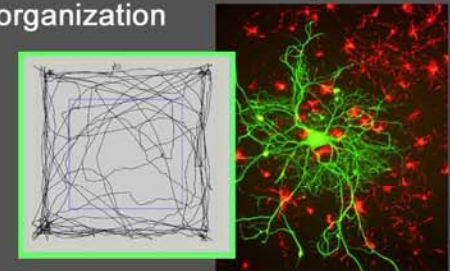
Developmental Psychobiology is the official publication of the International Society for Developmental Psychobiology.
